The Holocaust



This picture shows terrified Jewish people in the Warsaw Ghetto, and Nazi guards with guns.

The Holocaust was the attempt by the Nazis and their collaborators to murder all the Jews in Europe. Six million Jewish men, women and children were killed in ghettos, mass-shootings, concentration camps and extermination camps.

Why 27 January?

27 January 1945 – Auschwitz-Birkenau was liberated.

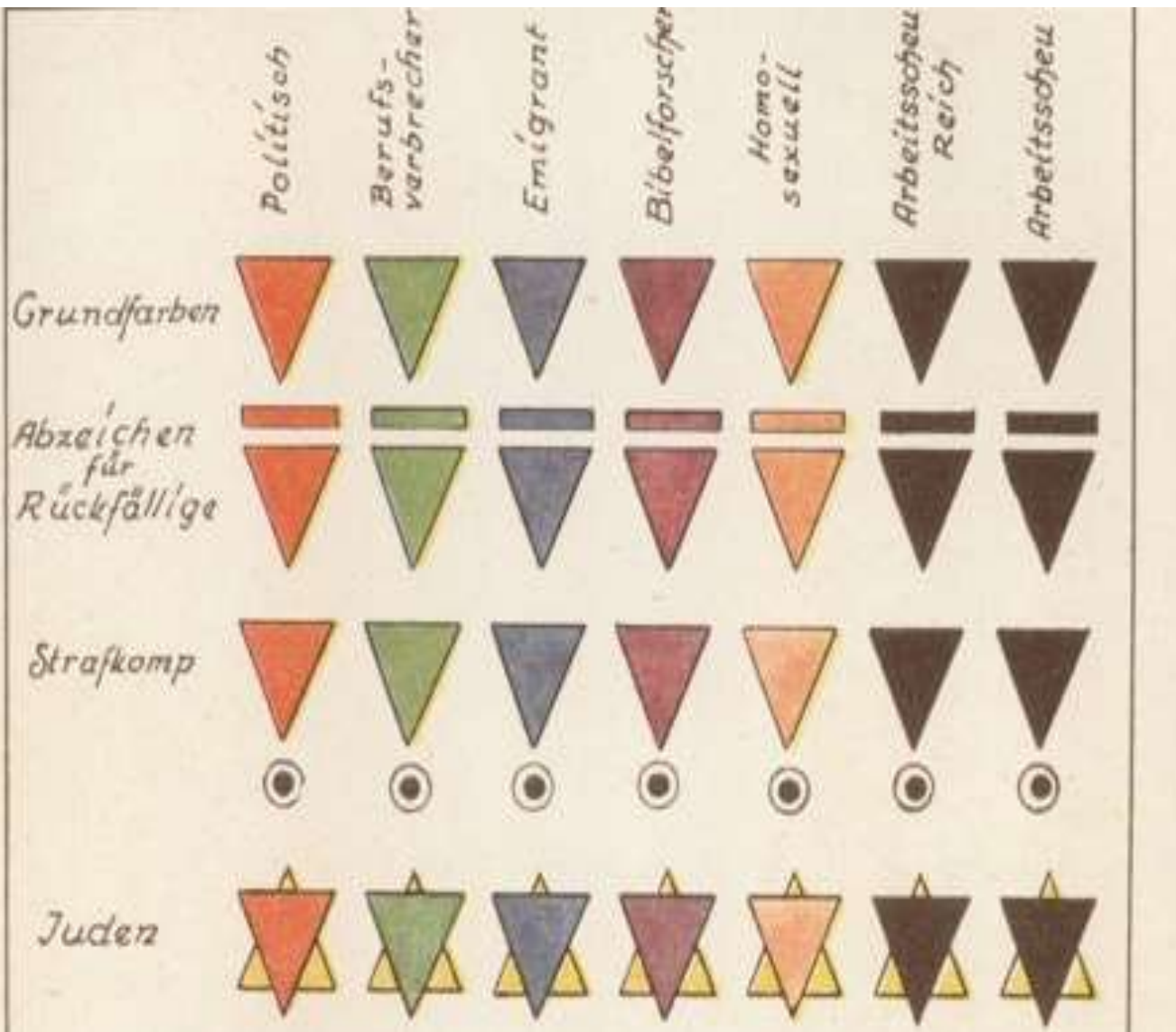
Susan Pollack



*'How do you get over such an experience?
Is it possible to walk away and learn to live with all of this?
How do you find the strength?
Life is precious – you can go in one of two ways – up or down.
I chose to walk away and rebuild my life.
There was no revenge, and no justice.'*

Susan grew up in Hungary, and experienced antisemitism from a young age. In 1944 Susan was sent to Auschwitz-Birkenau, where she was separated from her family. After the war, she found out that more than 50 of her relatives had been killed and that only she and her brother had survived.

Nazi Persecution



On Holocaust Memorial Day, we also remember other groups of people who were persecuted and murdered by the Nazis. These include: Roma and Sinti people (sometimes referred to as 'gypsies'), disabled people, gay people, Jehovah's Witnesses, political opponents and many others.

Different groups of people were given different coloured badges in concentration camps

Rudolf Brazda



'If I finally speak, it's for people to know what we, homosexuals, had to endure in Hitler's days... it shouldn't happen again.'

Rudolf Brazda was the last known concentration camp survivor deported specifically for homosexuality. He was sent to prison twice, and then deported to Buchenwald concentration camp in 1942 where he was subject to forced labour for 32 months.



After the Holocaust, the world said 'Never Again'. But humanity has failed to learn lessons from the Holocaust, and genocides continue to happen around the world, to this day. On Holocaust Memorial Day we remember the millions of men, women and children, who have been murdered in the genocides which followed – in Cambodia, Rwanda, Bosnia and Darfur.

What is genocide?



genocide /jen-uh-syd/ noun

killing of a very large number of people belonging to a particular ethnic group or nation.

- DERIVATIVES genocidal adjective
- ORIGIN from Greek genos 'race'.

genome /jee-nohm/ noun

chromosomes.

Genocide is when a group of people is targeted for destruction just because of who they are, such as their race or their religion. This has happened in many countries around the world.

HOW CAN THIS HAPPEN?

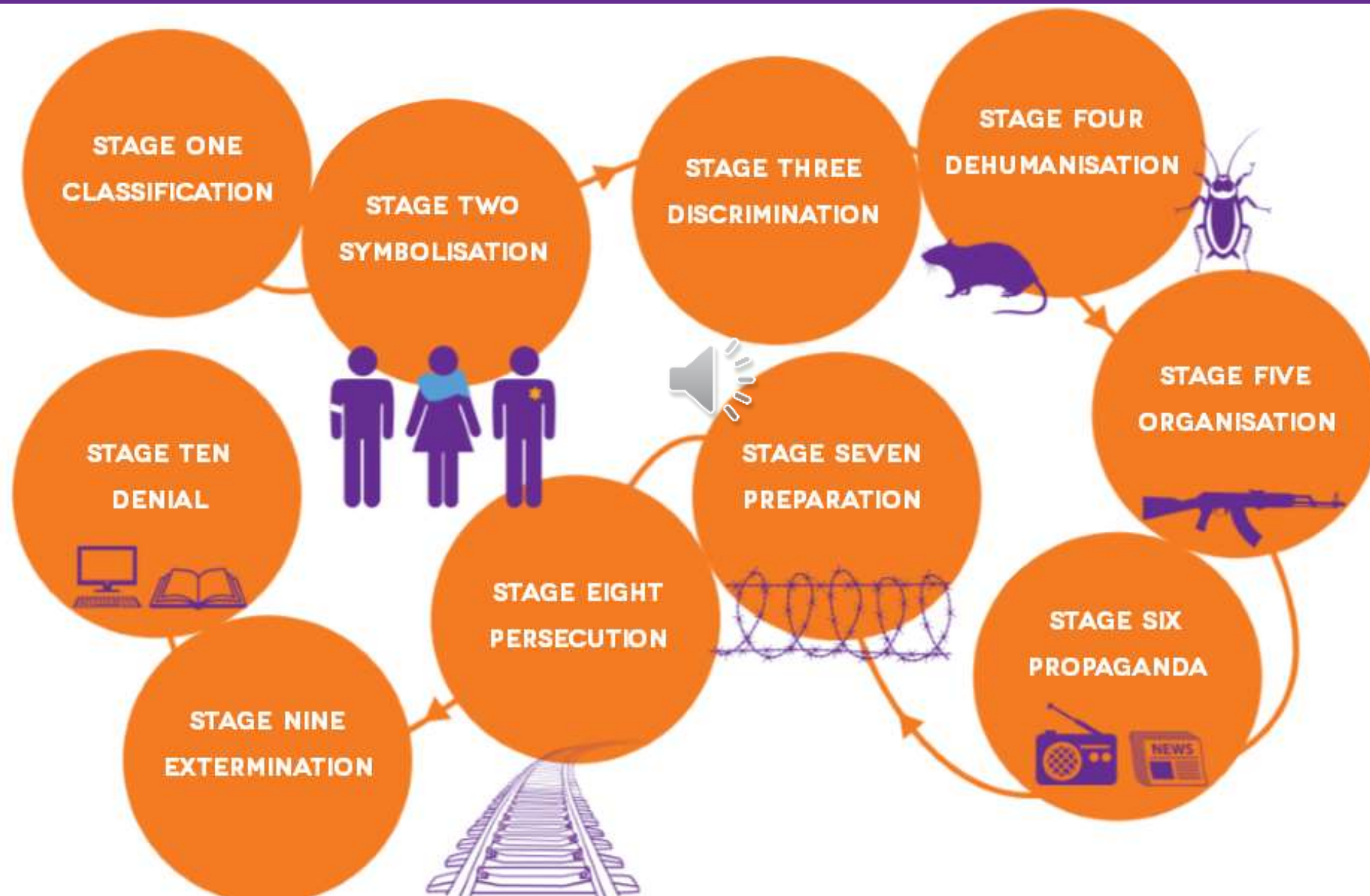
Genocide does not happen out of the blue – it is the result of **prejudice and persecution** which sees a group treated differently from the rest of society.

It starts at a very basic level – name calling, using racist language, thinking and believing that other groups of people are not your equal or have equal rights.

On Holocaust Memorial Day, we are reminded of what can happen when prejudice and persecution are left unchallenged, **and of our responsibilities to stand against these processes when we see them in our own communities.**

The next image shows ‘the 10 stages of genocide’ and helps us to know what warning signs to look out for. The stages may occur simultaneously or in a different order.

Why is this important to us?

People are still discriminated against today because of their religion, their race, their sexuality, or another element of their identity. Whilst we are not at immediate risk of genocide here in the UK, hate speech and prejudice are frequently seen online, and the number of hate crimes recorded each year has been increasing.
